This symposium, in two parts, presents papers from members of a collaborative, international research team that consider how policies and practices aiming for age equity alongside care considerations are conceived and pursued.

In part one, we consider what are the consequences of growing old and needing care in a world shaped by inequality? Who does the care? What are the challenges?

Considering how we create the conditions to age equitably, alongside the need to provide and receive care, is the objective of this symposium. The papers address critical questions of relationality by explicitly taking up care relations, care labour supply, and the conditions for caring work as a key component of the conditions for ageing with equity. Using extensive literature, empirical and comparative analytical methods, this symposium delves into conditions for ageing and caring, asking how they could be improved for different communities living in high-income welfare states. Insisting that equitable ageing depends on equitable care conditions, the contributors draw on extensive empirical research to offer theoretically informed and contextualized analysis, including policy and practice insights that chart a path toward more equitable, inclusive futures for ageing populations alongside all those who care, as family members, friends, and as paid workers.

Across the studies, the aim is to explore ageing equitably with care, while also revealing the ways in which the relationship – between age equity and care -- is thwarted.
